LETTUCE DISCUSS URBAN AGRICULTURE

What is Urban Agriculture?

Think of Urban Agriculture as anything a farmer does. Such as tending soil, harvesting, raising livestock, or beekeeping. And performing these tasks within a city or urban area.

Can I keep chickens on my property?

Yes, if your property is at least 7,000 sq feet and you have one single-family dwelling you may have up to six chickens but no roosters. You can also have up to six (6) rabbits, two (2) turkeys, two (2) ducks, two (2) geese, and 10 pigeons. You can combine them, as long as you only have a total of 25 animals.

Where can I create a community garden?

The City allows community gardens in city owned vacant properties. Currently, the City is looking at amending the community garden policy. This change will allow gardens in inactive public park space and on other City owned lands.

What is the UAIZ (Urban Agriculture Incentive Zone)?

The UAIZ is a state law and tax benefit. Local jurisdictions and private landowners may enter into a contract. As long as the property is only used for agricultural purposes, owners are eligible for a tax benefit. Contracts are for a minimum of five (5) years and properties must be between 0.1 and 3 acres and contain no habitable structures.

What should be my first step if I want to grow produce in my neighborhood?
